

## **Session 2: God's Plan of Salvation**

Last time we learned about God and the story of the world from a Christian worldview. We covered creation, the fall, sin and its consequences, and learned about the Law and the Ten Commandments. Today we meet the "hero" of the story, Jesus Christ, and we learn about God's plan of salvation. We'll talk about who Jesus is, His work of "redemption," and will look at some theological concepts: Jesus' States of Humiliation and of Exaltation.

God's plan of salvation is perhaps best summed up in this very familiar passage from John's Gospel:

John 3:16-17: <sup>16</sup> For God so loved the world, that he gave his only Son, that whoever believes in him should not perish but have eternal life. <sup>17</sup> For God did not send his Son into the world to condemn the world, but in order that the world might be saved through him.
